

GETTING THERE AND GETTING AROUND







DRIVING IN CHICAGO

DON'T if you can avoid it.



- BUT IFYOU MUST: Park at Millennium Garages. There are four underground garages in the Millennium Park area that charge anywhere from \$15 for 8 hour parking to \$22 for 24 hour parking. Buy a parking pass online for the cheapest rate (milleniumgarages.com). You won't beat this rate. Anywhere else will cost you \$40 and up for the day.
- Avoid driving at rush hour: 6:30-9 am and 4:30-7 pm. on weekdays.
 Avoid major events, like Lollapalooza or the Blues Festival.
- Weekends are much better than weekdays.

BNSF METRA TRAINS—PARK AND RIDE

- Use the BNSF Metra Train system for traveling from further outside Chicago.
- Like the subway system, one may park outside the city and ride the train to downtown.
- All trains will take you to Union Station, which is one mile from Millennium Park.
- The one-day Ventra pass will NOT work on these trains. The cost varies with the distance from Union Station.

l often travel from Lagrange Rd. to Union Station. The trip takes about 40 minutes, and costs around **\$8**.



SUBWAY—PARK AND RIDE

- Go to <u>https://www.transitchicago.com/</u> <u>parking/</u> for locations of parking near subway stops on the outskirts of downtown.
- Chicago's new Ventra system offers the following rates for <u>unlimited</u> CTA subway and busses:
- I-Day CTA Pass for \$10
- 3-Day CTA Pass for \$20


BICYCLE RENTAL



- NOTE: <u>I only use bikes on the Chicago Lakefront Bike Trail</u>, which, as the name suggests, runs along Lake Michigan for 19 miles. The bike trail is useful for traversing north and south along the edge of Chicago. From Millennium Park, one can bike along this trail to get closer to places like Lincoln Park or Shedd Aquarium.
- Each bike has a rack with straps (for your tripod!)
- DIVVY bike rental is \$3 for each 30 minutes of use.
- DIVVY bike rental stations are located all along the Lakefront Bike Trail.





THE CHICAGO CULTURAL CENTER

- Opened in 1897
- Contains two ornate glass domes, one being the largest Tiffany glass dome in the world.
- Constructed with Carrera marble, Vermont marble, Knoxville marble, and Irish marble.
- Bring your tripod!








TWO AMAZING GLASS DOMES

THE PALMER HOUSE HOTEL

First opened on Sept. 26, 1871, it burned down thirteen days later in the great Chicago fire. Rebuild completed in 1875.




THE ROOKERY BUILDING

Built in 1888, the interior of the Rookery building was redesigned by Frank Lloyd Wright in 1907.

Entering the lobby is free; guided tours which go further into the building cost \$7.

The lobby atrium of the Rookery Building







JAMES R. THOMPSON CENTER


The James R. Thompson Center, opened in 1985, houses Illinois State government offices.

Thompson Center back to Millennium Park .5 miles, I2 minute walk




THE JOHN HANCOCK CENTER

When opened in 1968, it was the second tallest building in the world.

The 94th floor, known as "360° Chicago," is open to the public. \$21-\$23 depending on the season.




Tripods are allowed, but you will be shooting through a window.






FOURTH PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH, dedicated in 1914-














TOUR 4: THE LAKEFRONT


From Millennium Park to a good spot for cityscapes is I.9 miles, or 45 minute walk.

In the summer, rent a bicycle (Divvy Station), .6 mile walk from Millennium Park.



Walk 1/2 mile through the parks to the Chicago Lakefront Trail, where you'll find Divvy bike rentals.








Adler Planetarium —Good spot for Chicago Skyline
