

Photoshop Tips & Tricks

Multiple copies of Background layer – You might want to treat separate parts of image differently so create a copy of the Background layer first

Textures – for textures to add to photos, take your own photos of textures. Rusted metal, old paint on exterior walls, water drops on windows, old wood, fabric, etc.

Easy vignette

- Create a new, blank layer
- Paint black for vignette using a very large brush, which makes for a softer look
- lower opacity of the layer to your liking

How to make any scene look like Fall

- Change the Mode to LAB mode
- Select Image > Apply Image
- Change the Blending field to Soft Light or Overlay
- Change the Channel field to b

Check your composition by temporarily flipping it either left to right or upside down. Select from the menu, Image > Image Rotation > Flip Canvas Horizontal (or Vertical)

Customize the toolbar- Click and hold on three dots near bottom of toolbar and select Edit Toolbar. You can move frequently used tools and remove rarely used ones

Cleaning sensor dust spots from image - Make Levels layer; move the left and right sliders under the histogram, towards the middle; change blend mode to Luminosity; clean/remove spots

Customize the Remove tool – to speed up your work, uncheck the “Remove after each stroke” checkbox in the Options Bar. Then it won’t remove the distraction after each brushstroke

To find color imbalance add Hue/Sat layer - Slide Saturation to 100. If any one color is saturated more than another, it will dominate the image. Then add a Hue/Sat or Color Balance adjustment layer and move the sliders away from that dominant color. Or try the two solutions below.

Two ways to color-correct an image:

- Use Colorize - From menu, select Filter > Neural Filters, then select Colorize. Play with the color sliders to adjust
- Use Match Color – From menu, select Image > Adjustments > Match Color. Check the Neutralize box. You can then Fade the effect, etc.

If using nikk Silver Efex for black and white images - Try photo filters in nikk

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If turning to B&W, increase reds and/or blues in LR then it will accentuate the them in nik when using the a nik photo filter

Create a second window of your photo while working on it. One can be zoomed in, and one can be zoomed out. What you do in one is also reflected in the other window. Select Window/Arrange/New Window from the menu.

Swapping ratio orientation - Use the “swap” arrows between the Width and Height values in the toolbar (for Marquee, Crop, etc.). Useful when switching between vertical and horizontal aspect ratios.

New Contextual Task Bar – can be moved; pinned in a location; hidden

To create Infrared effect - In Lightroom,

- Convert to B&W (V key)
- Select the B&W tab
- Slide Yellow and Green to +100
- Slide Blue and Aqua to -100
- In the Basic tab, slide Temp and Tint to the left
- Might help to slide Blacks to the left also
- Try to change Contrast slider and Shadows slider for greater effect
- To add an infrared glow, slide Clarity to the left
